# Committee on Victim Assistance – Purpose

- To build upon the solid foundation the States Parties have constructed on the issue of victim assistance, in order to support States Parties in their national efforts to strengthen and advance victim assistance, in particular in States Parties with mine victims in areas under their jurisdiction or control
- To ensure balance between ongoing discussions on pertinent aspects of victim assistance within the framework of the Convention itself, taking the discussion on meeting the needs and guaranteeing the rights of mine victims to other fora where relevant and related issues are debated



# **Committee on Victim Assistance – Mandate**

- Provide advice and support to States Parties in the fulfilment of their commitments under the OAP draw observations and assist these States Parties in making their needs known
- Facilitate discussion on ways and means of enhancing victim assistance
- Raise awareness of the importance of addressing the needs and rights of mine victims in broader domains
- Review relevant information provided by the States Parties
- Consider matters related to gender and the diverse need
- Present conclusions and recommendations



# OAP– Victim Assistance

## Action 33 – 41

- Assign government entity / develop an action plan and monitor and report on implementation based on SMART objectives to support mine victims / ensure a multi-sectoral approach
- Establish or strengthen a centralised database / disaggregated by gender, age and disability / make this information available to relevant stakeholders to ensure a comprehensive response
- Provide effective and efficient first aid and ongoing medical care
- national referral mechanism to facilitate access to services /comprehensive directory of services.
- Ensure access to comprehensive rehabilitation services and psychological and psychosocial support services, including through the provision of outreach rehabilitation service
- ensure the social and economic inclusion of mine victims
- Ensure that relevant national humanitarian response and preparedness plans provide for the safety and protection of mine survivors in situations of risk
- Ensure the full inclusion and effective participation of mine victims



# Victim Assistance – Checklist

Action #34 Carry out multi-sectoral efforts to ensure that the needs and rights of mine victims are effectively addressed through national policy and legal frameworks relating to disability, health, education, employment, development and poverty reduction, in line with the relevant provisions of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.
