Intervention on behalf of the UN Mine Action Team

Madame Co-Chair¹,

Thank you for giving me this opportunity to deliver the following statement on behalf of the United Nations Mine Action Team (UNMAT), comprising 14 UN partners involved in mine action².

Destruction of stockpiles of antipersonnel mines remains a key obligation of the Antipersonnel Mine Ban Convention (APMBC) and an indispensable measure to achieve a mine-free world. While many countries that have not yet acceded to the APMBC have not used antipersonnel mines and/or have committed not to transfer through a unilateral moratorium, many still keep important arsenals of these weapons, and may be prone to use them during armed conflict, as has been the case recently in Middle East. Stockpiles of mines could also fall in the hands of non-state armed actors and be then used; a situation that we have also witnessed recently.

The UNMAT was glad to hear that the expected date for the destruction of the remaining Turkish stockpiles of antipersonnel mines, now physically in Germany, is 31st August 2011.

We hope agreements in course with the EC and other donors will allow envisaging an early date for the destruction of the remaining PFM-1 stockpiles in Belarus and Ukraine.
