Process	Leadership training for landmine victims:
	a) Trainees will come to Geneva three days before each
	Intersessional Work Session to be briefed on the
	issues to be covered in each Standing Committee.
	They will sit through the sessions, and then
	participate in post-session discussions to discuss and
	process the session.
	b) Trainees will decide what steps they can take to
	further Intersessional Work goals between sessions
	and will receive guidance to plan their activities.
	c) Trainees will be in contact with each other and with
	relevant counterparts in the Standing Committees
	and the ICBL between sessions.
	d) It should be expected that the level of participation of
	the landmine victims will increase over time
	according to the interests and skills of the individuals.
	e) It is suggested that a core group of trainees be
	consistent participants, i.e. that they come to each
	Intersessional Session over a period of one-two years.
	Other slots could be rotating slots, so that part of the
	group will have some exposure to the process, and
	part of the group will have a thorough and in-depth
	knowledge of the issues.
