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Stockpile Destruction

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Stockpiled antipersonnel landmines far outnumber those actually laid in the ground. In addition to governments, many armed groups have stockpiles of landmines. Article 4 of the Antipersonnel Mine Ban Treaty requires States Parties to destroy their stockpiles no later than four years after the Treaty's entry into force. Consequently, it is expected that the first group of States Parties will have destroyed their stockpiled antipersonnel landmines by March 2003.
