## "The Cartagena Action Plan, the Vientiane Action Plan and CBR" Firoz Ali Alizada, ICBL

Cartagena Action Plan (CAP) was adopted by the States Parties to the Mine Ban Treaty in Nov-Dec 2009. Actions  $\underline{23-33}$  of CAP are about victim assistance. Vientiane Action Plan (VAP) was adopted by the States parties to the Convention on Cluster Munitions in Nov 2010. Actions  $\underline{24-32}$  of VAP are about victim assistance. There are a lot of similarities and added values in CAP and VAP. The table below shows similarities and added values in both action plans.
