## 9<sup>th</sup> Meeting of States Parties to the Convention on the Prohibition of the Use, Stockpiling, Production and transfer of Anti-Personnel Mines and on Their Destruction

## Mine Clearance 27 November 2008

Mr. President,

As it has been repeatedly stated by this delegation, on previous occasions, Greece has maintained minefields, along the Evros river, in the North-East part of the country, along the border with neighboring Turkey, since 1974. A total of 24.751 antipersonnel mines were emplaced in the above mentioned areas, of which 22.589 M16 type and 2.162 M2 type.

All minefields have been clearly defined and marked and have doublefenced perimeters, well above the requirements of established NATO

standards.

Clearance of antipersonnel mines in the Evros minefields, started immediately following the ratification of the MBT, and is carried out by the Land Minefield Clearance Battalion (TENX), under the responsibility of the Ministry of Defense.

According to official data provided for the purpose of this meeting by the Ministry of Defense, as of 20 November 2008, Greece has completed demining operations in 49 of the minefields in question, while operations

continue in the remaining 8.

Out of the total of 24.751 antipersonnel mines in the above mentioned mined areas, 21.403, corresponding to 86,47%, have been cleared and destroyed.

With an average cost of 800.000 EUROS per year, the total cost of the

operation so far has reached the sum of 3.5 million EUROS.

Given the progress achieved so far on clearance operations, in compliance with the provisions of article 5 of the Convention, Greece will fulfill its mine clearance obligations, by 2010, 4 years in advance of the deadline of 2014, established by the relevant provision of the Convention.
