With the view of reducing the yearly amount of victims of accidents resulting from explosives and increasing socioeconomic development in post-conflict area, the destruction of landmines and Explosive Remnants of War, including cluster munitions, are part of the integrated Dutch policy on rebuilding after conflict.

The Netherlands has for many years allocated large amounts of funds to mine action programmes on survey, clearance, risk education, victim assistance and local capacity building. Through its 'Mine Action and Cluster Munitions' multi-annual programme (2016-2020), the Netherlands is contributing a total of €45 million euro to NGO partners Mines Advisory Group, Danish Church Aid and the HALO Trust for mine action activities in 14 different countries: Afghanistan, Colombia, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Iraq, Lebanon, Libya, the Palestinian Territories, Mali, Somalia, Syria, South-Sudan, Kosovo, Yemen and Ukraine. Of this total amount €10 million euro is reserved for emergency response. Since 2018, the Netherlands is also supporting the Geneva International Centre for Humanitarian Demining.

In addition, the Netherlands provides an annual (unearmarked) contribution to the UNMAS Voluntary Trust Fund. In 2018, the Netherlands also made an earmarked contribution to UNMAS Afghanistan for activities to be implemented in 2019 and deployed a Dutch IED expert to UNMAS HQ in New York to support the UN IED threat mitigation unit. In 2018, the Netherlands continued its support to the UNDP Mine Action Programme in Yemen.

The total contribution in 2018 from The Kingdom of the Netherlands to NGO's and multilateral organisations for Humanitarian Mine Action was EUR 15.935.088.²
