


### **Oslo Action Plan**

  - f. Victim Assistance (Actions 33-41)
  - g. Cooperation and Assistance (Actions 42 -47)
  - h. Compliance (Actions 48 50)
- Baseline established by the Coordinating Committee on implementation and presented to the Eighteenth Meeting of the States Parties.








# **Cooperation and Assistance**

- Commit the resources needed to meet Convention obligations as soon as possible and explore innovative financing
- Disseminate information on challenges and requirements for assistance
- strengthen national coordination including by ensuring regular dialogue with national and international stakeholders on progress, challenges and support for implementation of their obligations under the Convention
- States Parties in a position to do so will provide assistance to other States Parties in the implementation
- Sates Parties in a position to provide assistance will, where possible using existing mechanisms, coordinate their support implementation of their obligations under the Convention
- Explore opportunities for cooperation, including international, regional and bilateral, cooperation between affected States Parties or South-to-South, with a view to voluntary sharing of best practices and lessons learned
